Gambier Bolton Wild Animal Photographer

Gambier Bolton was born in 1854. He was the son of Rev James Jay Bolton of Kilburn, and direct decendant London а of Oughtrede de Bolton, Lord of Bolton, the lineal representative of the saxon Earls of Mercia, 1135, Gambier Bolton was educated at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge.


He worked at the zoo and began taking images of the animals. He became a popular amateur photographer of captive animals and quickly gained recognition through his high quality work. As his popularity grew he began to travel to exotic countries in order to captured images of wild



animals. He was the world's first celebrated animal photographer for his candid photographs of wild animals. His numerous articles. his lecturing and books regarding animals. natural

history psychic and phenomena. His photographic work extended broadly. however he is less known for the hundreds of images published in scientific records, Volume 9 No. 4, Sep 2011

journals and books of zoology. As a member of the zoological society he was afforded access to many wild animals in captivity.

Gambier is described as having been in every zoo in the US and Europe studying animals. He has recorded traveling to Europe, Americas, Canada, Hawaiian Islands, Japan, China, Java, The Maylay peninsula, Burmah, South Africa, Mashbonsland, Manicaland, Portugese East Africa, Transvaal, Cape Colony, etc.

His work can be found in the more popular articles including, Funny Foreign Dogs, The Larger Cats, On Giraffes Generally, Some Eccentric Animals, Pictures in the Human Skin, Orang-Utan, Ghosts in the solid, a book of Beasts and Birds, the animals of the bible, and psychic force.

In 1893 to 1894 Gambier accompanied the Duke of Newcastle on his world tour. They shared a common interest of photographing natural history subjects.

In an 1896 Churchill magazine article, it described the danger Gambier faced during shoots, as was represented by a hole on his cameras focusing cloth which was marked with the words 'tiger claw', providing a reminder of a close encounter when a tiger made a swipe at the photographer through the cage bars during a shoot at the zoo. In a 1900 article in The World Wide magazine, it described how Gambier's life was threatened by an attack from a charging Wapiti that was being photographed. Gambier used his large camera and tripod's three pointed stand legs to thwart the attack only bringing more intrigue to the photos presented.



In 1899, W. Watson & Sons constructed a camera based on the famous photographer's specification. The Gambier Bolton Camera was designed by Gambier to serve as a combination camera for the use of long distance photography or as a readily available hand camera. The camera was constructed of mahogany and covered in black leather. This camera provided a full size finder with the image being reflected by a mirror. A reversible back that was accessible by opening a rear cover. The camera was designed to use a single lens

with rack and pinion focusing for lenses of six and one-half inches focal length and upwards. A Thornton-Pickard focal plane shutter was provided in the rear of the camera behind the lens and in front of the plate. The shutter can provide exposures ranging from 1/10th to 1/1000 of a second or a time shutter can be used on the front if desired. Fitted with a rapid rectilinear lens with an iris diaphragm. Made in three sizes, a quarter plate, a 5 x 4 inch and a half plate. Camera and lens combined sold at £13 12s 0d for the quarter plate, £14 11s 0d for the 5 x 4 and £17 10s 0d for the half plate. Needless to say this is a rare and historic camera.

Gambier Bolton died July 29, 1929.

Luzo Camera



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The Luzo Camera was manufactured by the H. J. Redding & Gyles firm of London England from approximately 1896 to 1899. The camera was advertised as the latest and most improved loading and unloading in daylight. Constructed of highly polished Spanish mahogany, to high standards equal to quality furniture. It was fitted with a rectilinear lens of very good defining quality. The finder was of biconcave form gives an image of remarkable brilliancy. The shutter provides a variation of exposure from time to instantaneous. It took celluloid roll film that provided a count upon film advance.
